Passover: Friday April 19 - Saturday April 27

On Passover, Jews around the world celebrate a foundational moment in our story: the Exodus from Egypt. This narrative of slavery to liberation informs conversations about what a just society must look like, including love for the immigrant. Acutely aware of our history of forced



migration and the Biblical imperative to love the immigrant, many Jewish communities are deeply committed to immigrant justice work. The texts below can serve as a resource for Jews to use during their Seder and for people of all religions to learn more about caring for immigrants.

In the midst of our most joyous celebration we acknowledge the pain our liberation caused for others by taking wine out of our cups as we recite the ten plagues. It teaches us that the lesson of compassion is inextricably linked to the lesson of liberation. Over and over the Torah reminds us, "You know the heart of the stranger for you were strangers in the land of Egypt." To paraphrase the haggadah, those who have not understood compassion have not fulfilled their obligation.
